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SIGNS MOU WITH NIOS

A DOUBLE EDGED COOPERATION ON ACADEMIC LINKAGE AND VT CERTIFICATION

A significant achievement of the quarter was signing of an MoU between National Institute of Open Schooling (NIOS) and FVTRS to facilitate vertical mobility of school dropout youth trainees who undergo vocational training (VT) to link them to the next academic levels like SSLC and PUC in an attempt to provide recognition and value addition.

A series of meetings with NIOS preceded in the past six months to accelerate the finalisation process of MoU between NIOS and FVTRS. On 16 June, the MoU has been signed by Mr G C Saxena, IAS, Secretary on behalf of NIOS and Mr Albert Joseph, Executive Director of FVTRS in the presence of Dr S S Jena, Chairman and staff of NIOS.

PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION PLAN (PIP) WORKSHOP

SKILLS TRAINING NEEDS ANALYSIS (STNA) WORKSHOP

MEETING WITH MSME

Held discussions with Mr S K Goyal, Director, Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises (MSME) on 15 and 17 June. Sought cooperation on outsourcing defunct infrastructure available elsewhere in the country that belong to the ministry to start entrepreneurial development ventures. Locations under consideration are Dimapur, Goa, Bhopal, Lucknow, Aizwal and Agartala. These centres are being contacted to formalise the concept.

MEETING WITH NSDC

A meeting with Mr Youvaraj Galada, Vice President, National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) was held at New Delhi on 15 June to explore possible partnership/collaboration in the field of skill training. NSDC is focusing on potential models for skill development in the country through mobile (cell phone) technology. NSDC welcomed innovative ideas to take on further the cause of skill development from FVTRS.

EDP PROPOSAL TO VODAFONE

In continuation to the dialogue with Vodafone India Foundation, FVTRS submitted a concept note to Dr A K John, Advisor of Vodafone in a meeting held on 15 June. Held discussion on three options that were proposed by FVTRS. Detail project proposal is being prepared based on the feedback received from Vodafone regarding EDP related interventions.

MEETING AT DIRECTORATE GENERAL OF EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING (DGET)

Met Mr R L Singh, Director, Training at DGET on 16 June on possibility of involving ITIs in the proposed EDP programme. Discussed also the possibility of involving the faculty and trainees in EDP programmes organised by FVTRS at different locations in the country. The matter is to be further discussed with respective State government structures.

He welcomed the idea of organising specific EDP programmes for the trainees and faculties/trainers in ITIs.

EVALUATION OF THE CONCLUDED EU SUPPORTED PROJECT

Regional programme Promotion Centres (RPPCs) partners and FVTRS staff jointly discussed matters related to crucial areas/points in a final stock-taking meeting based on the above evaluation report in Bangalore on 21 June. Main findings and learnings were communicated to Misereor. Recommendations are already being put to practice in FVTRS operational strategy and the currently running EU supported project.

Two network meetings of associate partners of the project are fixed to be held at Mumbai and Puri on 19 August and on 31 August.

PROJECT MONITORING AND PRE-ASSESSMENT VISITS

NEW PROJECT PROPOSALS

80 projects proposals were received in the quarter. Out of these, 44 proposals are from EU supported project operational areas.

FUNDS RELEASED

Rs. 37 lakh has been released for various projects during the quarter.

STAFF CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRAMMES

LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME WORKSHOP

A three-day Leadership and Management (LAMP) programme was organised for FVTRS staff at Bangalore on 2-4 June. Mr Vivek Albuquerque, a Management Expert from Allen Management conducted it.

17 team members from Bangalore, and Dimapur, Jodhpur and Hyderabad regional offices under EU supported project participated. Workshop spread across sessions addressing leadership and management aspects. Each session was followed by interactive stimulation exercises and role plays.

Three groups were formed for group exercises, presentations, and brainstorming discussions. Each group has contributed to strengthen Vision and Mission statements of FVTRS through group discussions on the concluding day which would be further fine-tuned and documented. OUR STRENGTH

NACHIKA: 'TRADE UNION SISTERS'

Nachika Bhamini, 35, a poor tribal woman, is now a semi-skilled mason in the male-dominated masonry world. Earlier, when she was compelled to work as a construction worker at the age of 15 to feed her family of three, she was getting a daily wage of Rs 15/- only. She remained illiterate and unmarried. Struggling with poverty, she came to know about the vocational training run by **Ankuran, Rayagada,Orissa**. Bhamini joined the mason training course, which helped her to become a semi-skilled mason. Now she earns Rs 140/- per day.

Nachika Sirimi, younger sister of Bhamini was also a construction worker from the age of 15. Unlike her sister, she studied up to class V. Persuaded by Bhamini, she completed masonry training course and formed a group of trained women to take up construction work independently. The effort protects them from middlemen and their exploitation.

JIMMIMA MAKES TO TAMIL NADU

Jimmima learned how to measure, cut and stitch in-spite of her paralytic, poor language and chaotic conditions due to riots in Kandhamal, Orissa. She kept in her mind that she wants to work and earn her own living. Soon after the training, she managed to get a job in Tamil Nadu in a cotton factory. I will work first and earn enough money and buy one machine for myself and then stitch' was her resolve that paid dividend to her. Now she is

earning Rs. 3000/- per month. She underwent skill training at St. Joseph Community College, Bhubaneswar.

AMIT THE 'UNCHALLENGED'

Amit is a physically challenged and school dropout youth whose parents are agricultural labourers who work also in local brick kilns. He attended a cell phone repair, electronics and electric appliance repair course at Rashtriya Jan Vikas Sansthan, Jaunpur, Uttar Pradesh.

On completion, he started his own repair shop for mobile and electronics at a local market at Khampur Bazar, Jaunpur, Uttar Pradesh. He got a loan from the Cashpor Microcredit for this venture. He is earning Rs 200-300 per day.

TRAINED TO BE A PLUMBER

Narahari, a Dalit school dropout youth is a plumber in a local star hotel at Rayagada, Orissa. His journey to become a plumber started way back when he was compelled to discontinue his studies. He was the only bread earner for the family of five with two sisters and a brother. In search of work, he left the village and landed at Rayagada as an unskilled worker.

In the meantime, he came to know about the skills training course from a friend who got trained at **Ankuran**. He joined and learnt the skill on plumber trade. Narahari got the opportunity to work as a plumber at the hotel and earns a monthly salary of Rs 3000/- and able to meet the needs of his family.

EDITORIAL

'Good is not the Enemy of Great'

'After all, Good is not the Enemy of Great' is what was heard sound in one of the international meetings in New Delhi on Skill Development. The speaker was making a reference to the 'excellent' models of skills training to the 'satisfactory and good' models that are available and being implemented in the country by some well meaning sections, and exhorting the audience to get going without wasting time in the aimless persuit of excellence and reaching nowhere finally. The trend is true of what once a State politician told in the early seventies that we are in the race to make the system perfect without having a notion about what that vision is and blindly spending resources whether efforts will ever see the sun!

India is young. It is where one finds 70 per cent of the population lives below 35 years of age. 94 per cent of the workforce belongs to the unorganised sector which contributes 58 per cent to the GDP, it is estimated that the share by/of the so called redundant youth faction alone comes to roughly 40 per cent to our economy! If not more. One can only imagine in this context, on that quantum jump to prosperity and size of Indian economy if all youth get the minimum space through opportunities at fair and good models (read not through excellent) and shape up our Indian economy and resultant prosperity that could dispel many of our present day serious concerns we are engaged with. Introducing and enhancing skill is the way-out. Let us start imagine and work for that reality as Albert Einstein told 'Imagination is better than knowledge' as knowledge has a connotation also on excellence.
