SKILL INDIA - Making Underprivileged Youth Employable

15th National Skill Conference (NSC) Skills for a Changing World



The 15th National Skill Conference held on October 12 and 13, 2023, in Bangalore, brought together leaders, experts, and organizations dedicated to skill development, employment, and social impact. There were total of 134 participants and 20 resource persons and special guests. The conference, hosted by FVTRS (*Functional Vocational Training and Research Society*), showcased a diverse range of sessions, panel discussions, and key insights aimed at shaping the future of skill development in India.

Day 1

The conference commenced with a formal session on October 12, featuring distinguished guests such as Fr. VM Thomas, Dr. Shalini Saxena, Mr. Satyanarayan Patnaik, and Mr. Felix D'Souza. Dr. Sharan Prakash Patil, the Honourable Minister for Skill Development and Medical Education, officially inaugurated the event, expressing the government's interest in collaborating with FVTRS.

During the inaugural speech, Minister Patil praised FVTRS's work and announced the government's support for collaboration. A notable moment was the release of the case study document on women entrepreneurs, a project implemented by FVTRS with the support of CITI bank and Child Fund India. Mr. Jimmy Mathew, Manager at FVTRS made a brief presentation about FVTRS. Fr. V.M Thomas , the president of FVTRS extended the presidential address and briefed the work done by FVTRS. Mr. Felix D' Souza, Executive director gave the vote of thanks.

The first day's sessions primarily focused on micro-planning for FVTRS's strategy, discussions on the future direction of the Skill Promoting India network (SPIN), insights into digital marketing from WeCAN, and commemorating FVTRS's 30th anniversary. Micro-strategy planning involved FVTRS staff members crafting state-level plans in areas such as quality expansion, resource mobilization, and marketing.

The General Body meeting of SPIN discussed matters like the election of new office bearers, membership renewal, and the formulation of a new strategy plan. Key decisions included changes in office bearers, membership fee structures, and the renewal of society registration.

The day concluded with a celebration of FVTRS's 30th anniversary, accompanied by awards and recognition for outstanding performances in various categories.





Day 2 - Keynote Address and Panel Discussions

The conference continued on October 13 with a keynote address by Dr. Shalini Rajneesh, Additional Chief Secretary, Government of Karnataka. Dr. Rajneesh emphasized the pivotal role of skilling in national development and advocated for a Public-Private-Partnership (PPP) approach.

Discussions revolved around the learner-focused approach, the shift from digital literacy to digital fluency, and the importance of continuous learning. The panellists stressed the need to instil career decision-making skills and foster responsible citizenry.





Recommendations

The conference concluded with recommendations for follow-up actions, including the development of an ESG compliance policy and a focus on renewable energy. FVTRS instituted national awards in various categories, recognizing the commendable work of NGOs, CSR foundations, and others contributing to social development and nation-building.

- * Constant review of approach and method to keep relevant and updated through studies and action research
- * Study and explore the potentials of digital science and related skills



Award Ceremony

The valedictory function was commemorated the 15th National Skill Conference with an award ceremony and recognization persons who did extra ordinary work in the sector of social development.

National Review of Programmes

A four-day review meeting was conducted by the Functional Vocational Training and Research Society (FVTRS) in Kottayam, Kerala, The meeting successfully brought together 35 Field Consultants and Field In-charges from 12 Indian states, providing a robust platform for sharing best practices, addressing challenges, and strategizing for the future. The primary focus of the meeting was to enhance staff capacity, improve skill training outcomes, and foster innovation in the organization's approach.

The three days programme started with an inauguration The inaugural day set the stage for the review meeting, with a strong emphasis on the importance of staff capacity



building. The event was facilitated by Mr. Nicholas and Mr. Sajeesh, with Mr. Felix, the Executive Director of FVTRS, outlining its objectives. Mr. Nicholas presented the comprehensive agenda for the four day program.

Field staff members played a pivotal role by sharing their invaluable experiences and best practices. They highlighted successful strategies in program implementation, emphasizing key takeaways such as identifying job opportunities, maintaining structured curricula, meticulous training record-keeping, and conducting effective follow-ups for trainee placements. Challenges, including trainee dropouts and difficulties in mobilizing youth, were acknowledged. The first day laid a solid foundation for the review meeting, showcasing the dedication and innovation of FVTRS staff in their relentless efforts to enhance youth employability through skill training.

Presentations:

Field staff members presented detailed insights into their projects, sharing data on youth training, placement outcomes, and resource mobilization efforts. The presentations highlighted successful initiatives, such as collaborating with government departments, organizing job fairs, and securing free resources. Challenges, including registration fee collection, government support, and timely payments, were thoroughly discussed. Life skill Master Training Report- Kolkata



"Life skill training for life changing experience"

n a four-day intensive training program organized by FVTRS Life Skill Club, participants from various states, including MP, UP, West Bengal, Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, and Odisha, gathered in Kolkata from 11th to 14th September 2023. The event, the 14th of its kind, saw the active participation of 28 individuals, nine of whom were FVTRS staff, while the remaining attendees represented diverse organizations.

The master training program was facilitated by resource persons Mr. Sajeesh and Dr. Rakesh Shrivastava, focused on crucial interpersonal skills during its first phase. Participants delved into topics such as the Importance of Facilitation Skills, Selfawareness, Emotions Management, Attitude, and the strategic use of social media as a marketing tool. The primary objective of the initial phase was to instill an understanding of the significance of self-facilitation before guiding others through the process of change. Throughout the training, participants were given opportunities to showcase their mastery of facilitation skills. Input sessions aided in identifying individual strengths and weaknesses, fostering effective facilitation. Each demonstration was followed by constructive feedback and appreciation, enhancing the participants' grasp of facilitation methods. The demo sessions proved instrumental in comprehending various facilitation tools, methods, and session structures with objective-based plans.

An assignment plan was also formulated during the training, providing participants with a platform to practice and reinforce their learnings after the first phase. Feedback from participants highlighted the transformative impact of the program on their lives, with many expressing that the FVTRS Life Skill Training was a unique blend of activities, fun, and immersive learning. Participants lauded the program for its experiential approach, emphasizing that it stood out among other life skill training programs they had attended.

A key feature of FVTRS facilitation, as noted by participants, is its emphasis on involving individuals in the learning experience. The principle of experiential learning was credited with bringing about positive changes in the lives of participants. Several participants expressed that, despite attending numerous life skill training programs, they had never encountered one that offered such a profound and engaging learning experience. The success of the 14th master training program underscores FVTRS's commitment to providing impactful and transformative life skill training, setting a benchmark for future initiatives in the field.
